### REPORT OF CANTERBURY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ON PROPOSED ALTERATIONS IN CUSTOMS TARIFF.

#### REPORT.

Report on the Tariff, agreed to by the Chamber at a Special Meeting held on the 8th and 11th July.

1. The Chamber having considered the question of the Tariff now in operation, as well as the alterations proposed by the Colonial Treasurer, have come to the undernoted conclusions with regard

to the rates of duty which it would be advisable to adopt on a number of articles of import.

2. The Chamber has not been able to agree with the proposed alterations in the Tariff as a whole,

and they submit other amendments on the present rates.

3. The Chamber thinks the drawback of one shilling on bulk and two shillings per gallon on Bottled Wines proposed by the Colonial Treasurer, is too small to bring about increased revenue or the extensive introduction of these beverages into New Zealand, if such objects are sought to be effected; but they believe it would be advantageous to the Colony if arrangements could be made with the Australian Governments to admit their wines into our ports free-conditional upon their reciprocating the arrangement with regard to our cereals.

4. The Chamber is of opinion that duty should be levied upon the gallon of proof spirits, and that

a proportionate allowance should be made for spirits under proof.

7. The Chamber does not see any reason why duties should be remitted from the following articles if an even balance of taxation is to be maintained, and would therefore propose the retention of the

previous rates; especially in the case of Ironmongery, where the duty is comparatively moderate, and in present circumstances the reduction would be a gratuitous loss to the revenue; and although they recommend the duties on Fencing Materials, Holloware, and other Ironmongery to be retained instead of admitting them duty free, they are of opinion that it would be still better to impose an ad valorem duty on such goods, and as provided in next clause of this report.

The Chamber recommends that instead of the present duties, an ad valorem duty should be levied on the following descriptions of goods, as they think a larger and more equitable taxation would be obtained thereby. The goods referred to vary exceedingly in quality and price, and it is impossible under any other system to raise duties fairly on them.

Soft Goods of all descriptions. Saddlery and Harness. Fencing Materials. Holloware. Tinware.

All descriptions of Ironmongery. Firearms and Swords.

Prints and Painting. Earthenware. Chinaware. Mantelpieces. Paperhangings. Boots and Shoes. Vamps and Uppers.
