## LETTERS PATENT, INSTRUCTIONS, AND COMMISSION OF HIS EXCELLENCY SIR HERCULES ROBINSON, G.C.M.G.

Presented to both Houses of the General Assembly by Command of His Excellency.

COPY OF LETTERS PATENT PASSED UNDER THE GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED KINGDOM, CONSTITUTING THE OFFICE OF GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE COLONY OF NEW ZEALAND AND ITS DEPENDENCIES

(Letters Patent, dated 21st February, 1879.)

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting.

1. Whereas We did, by certain Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Preamble. Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the sixth day of November, one thousand Recites Governor the Marquis of eight hundred and seventy-four, in the thirty-eighth year of Our Reign, constitute and appoint Our Normanby's, Right Trusty and Entirely-beloved Cousin and Councillor George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Commission, dated 6th Novem-Normanby, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George ber, 1874. (now Knight Grand Cross of Our said Most Distinguished Order), to be, for and during Our Will and Pleasure, Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies: And whereas We are desirous of making permanent provision for the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies without making new Letters Patent on each demise of the said Office: Now know ye that We do, by Revocation of these presents, revoke and determine the said recited Letters Patent, and everything therein contained: Governor's Commission. And further know ye that We, of Our special grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, do by these Office of presents constitute, order, and declare that there shall be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and tuted. over Our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies (which said Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies are hereinafter called "the Colony"), and that appointments to the said Office, when vacant, shall be made by Commission under Our Sign-Manual and Signet.

- 2. We do hereby authorize, empower, and command Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief Governor's (hereinafter called "the Governor") to do and execute all things that belong to his said Office, according authorities. to the tenor of these Our Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Colony.
  - 3. We do also by these Our Letters Patent declare Our will and pleasure as follows:-
- 4. Every person appointed to fill the Office of Governor shall, with all due solemnity, before Publication of entering on any of the duties of his Office, cause the Commission appointing him to be Governor to Governor's Combe read and published at the seat of Government, in the presence of the Chief Justice, or some other Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony, and of the Members of the Executive Council thereof, which being done, he shall then and there take before them the Oath of Allegiance, in the form Oaths to be taken provided by an Act passed in the Session holden in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second years of Our by Governor.

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Imperial Act, 31 Reign, intituled an Act to amend the Law relating to Promissory Oaths; and likewise the usual Oath & 32 Vict., c. 72. for the due execution of the Office of Governor, and for the due and impartial administration of justice; which Oaths the said Chief Justice or Judge is hereby required to administer.

Public Seal.

5. The Governor shall keep and use the Public Seal of the Colony for sealing all things whatsoever that shall pass the said Public Seal.

Executive Council: constitution

6. There shall be an Executive Council for the Colony, and the said Council shall consist of such persons as are now or may at any time be Members thereof in accordance with any Law enacted by the Legislature of the Colony, and of such other persons as the Governor shall, from time to time, in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject to any Law as aforesaid, appoint under the Public Seal of the Colony to be Members of Our said Executive Council.

Grant of lands.

7. The Governor, in Our name and on Our behalf, may make and execute, under the said Public Seal, grants and dispositions of any lands which may be lawfully granted and disposed of by Us within the Colony.

Appointment of Judges, Justices, &c.

8. The Governor may constitute and appoint, in Our name and on Our behalf, all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers of the Colony as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by Us.

Grant of pardons.

9. When any crime has been committed within the Colony, or for which the offender may be tried therein, the Governor may, as he shall see occasion, in Our name and on Our behalf, grant a pardon to any accomplice in such crime who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of the principal offender, or of any one of such offenders if more than one; and further, may grant to any offender convicted in any Court, or before any Judge, or other Magistrate, within the Colony, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any remission of the sentence passed on such offender, or any respite of the execution of such sentence for such period as the Governor thinks fit; and further may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures due or accrued to Us: Provided always that the Governor shall in no case, except where the offence has been of a political nature unaccompanied Proviso. Banish- by any other grave crime, make it a condition of any pardon or remission of sentence that the offender shall absent himself or be removed from the Colony.

- 10. The Governor may, so far as We Ourselves lawfully may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing, remove from his office, or suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office or place within the Colony, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by Us, in Our name, or under Our authority.

Summoning, proroguing, or dissolving any Legislative body. Appointment of

- members. Succession to the Government. Lieutenant-Governor. Administrator. Proviso. Lieu-tenant-Governor, &c., to take onths of office before Government. Duties and Letters Patent.
- 11. The Governor may exercise all powers lawfully belonging to Us in respect of the summoning, proroguing, or dissolving any Legislative Body, which now is or hereafter may be established within Our said Colony, and in respect of the appointment of Members thereto.
- 12. In the event of the death, incapacity, or removal of the Governor, or of his departure from the Colony, Our Lieutenant Governor, or, if there be no such Officer in the Colony, then such person or persons as We may appoint, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, shall, during Our pleasure, administer the Government of the Colony, first taking the Oaths hereinbefore directed to be taken by the Governor, and in the manner herein prescribed; which being done, We do hereby authorize, empower, and command Our Lieutenant Governor, and every other such Administrator as aforesaid, to administering the do and excute during Our pleasure all things that belong to the Office of Governor and Commanderin-Chief, according to the tenor of these Our Letters Patent, and according to Our Instructions as authorities under aforesaid, and the Laws of the Colony.

Governor may during his temposeat of Government.

13. In the event of the Governor having occasion to be temporarily absent for a short period appoint a deputy from the Seat of Government or from the Colony, he may in every such case, by an Instrument under rary absence from the Public Seal of the Colony, constitute and appoint Our Lieutenant Governor, or if there be no such Officer, then any other person to be his Deputy during such temporary absence, and in that capacity to exercise, perform, and execute for and on behalf of the Governor during such absence, but no longer, all such powers and authorities vested in the Governor, by these Our Letters Patent, as shall in and by such Instrument be specified and limited, but no others: Provided, nevertheless, that, by the appointment of a Deputy as aforesaid, the power and authority of the Governor shall not be abridged, altered, or in any way affected, otherwise than We may at any time hereafter think proper to direct.

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14. And We do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, Officers and and all other the inhabitants of the Colony, to be obedient, aiding, and assisting unto the Governor, or others to obey and assist the to such person or persons as may from time to time, under the provisions of these Our Letters Patent, Governor. administer the Government of the Colony.

15. And We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors, full power and authority Power reserved to from time to time to revoke, alter, or amend these Our Letters Patent as to Us or Them shall seem revoke, alter, or meet.

16. And We do direct and enjoin that these Our Letters Patent shall be read and proclaimed at Publication of such place or places within Our said Colony as the Governor shall think fit.

COPY OF INSTRUCTIONS PASSED UNDER |THE ROYAL SIGN-MANUAL AND SIGNET TO THE GOVERNOR AND COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE COLONY OF NEW ZEALAND AND ITS DEPENDENCIES.

(Dated 21st February, 1879.)

Instructions to Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, or, in his absence, to Our Lieutenant Governor or the Officer, for the time being, Administering the Government of Our said Colony and its Dependencies. Given at Our Court at Windsor, this Twenty-first day of February, 1879, in the Forty-second year of Our Reign.

1. Whereas by certain Letters Patent, bearing even date herewith, We have constituted, ordered, Preamble. and declared that there shall be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called Patent, consti-"the Governor") in and over Our Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies (which said Colony and tating the Office its Dependencies are therein and hereinafter called "the Colony"): And whereas We have thereby authorized and commanded the Governor to do and execute all things that belong to his said office according to the tenor of Our said Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Colony: Now, therefore, We do, by these Our Instructions under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, direct and enjoin and declare Our will and pleasure as follows:-

The Governor may, whenever he thinks fit, require any person in the public service to take the Oaths to be Oath of Allegiance, together with such other Oath or Oaths as may from time to time be prescribed administered by the Governor. by any Law in force in the Colony. The Governor is to administer such Oaths or cause them to be administered by some Public Officer of the Colony.

2. The Governor shall forthwith communicate these Our Instructions to Our Executive Council Governor to comfor the Colony, and likewise all such others, from time to time, as he shell find convenient for Our tions to Executive service to impart to them.

3. 4. Journals and minutes to be kept.

5. A full and exact journal or minute shall be kept of all the deliberations, acts, proceedings, votes, and resolutions of the Executive Council; and at each meeting of the said Council the Minutes of the last meeting shall be read over and confirmed or amended, as the case may require, before proceeding to the despatch of any other business.

Governor to consult Executive Council. Proviso. cases.

6. In the execution of the powers and authorities granted to the Governor by Our said Letters Patent, he shall in all cases consult with the Executive Council, excepting only in cases which are of Urgent such a nature that, in his judgment, Our service would sustain material prejudice by consulting the said Council thereupon, or when the matters to be decided are too unimportant to require their advice, or too urgent to admit of their advice being given by the time within which it may be necessary for him to act in respect of any such matters. In all such urgent cases he shall at the earliest practicable period communicate to the said Council the measures which he may so have adopted, with the reasons thereof.

May act in opposition to Executive Council. Reporting the grounds for so doing.

7. The Governor may act in the exercise of the powers and authorities granted to him by Our said Letters Patent in opposition to the advice given to him by the members of the Executive Council if he shall in any case deem it right to do so, but in any such case he shall fully report the matter to Us, by the first convenient opportunity, with the grounds and reasons of his action.

Rules to be observed in assenting to, dissenting from, or reserving Bills. not to be mixed in the same law. No clause to be introduced foreign to what the title imports. Temporary laws.

8. In the execution of such powers as are vested in the Governor by law for assenting to or dissenting from, or of reserving for the signification of Our pleasure, Bills which have been passed by the Legislature of the Colony, he shall take care, as far as may be practicable, that in the passing of Different subjects all Laws each different matter be provided for by a different Law, without intermixing in one and the same Law such things as have no proper relation to each other; and that no clause be inserted in or annexed to any Law which shall be foreign to what the title of such Law imports, and that no perpetual clause be part of any temporary Law.

Description of Bills not to be assented to.

- 9. The Governor shall not assent in Our name to any Bill of any of the classes hereafter specified, that is to say,—
  - (1.) Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in holy matrimony:
  - (2.) Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may bemade to himself:
  - (3.) Any Bill affecting the currency of the Colony:
  - (4.) Any Bill imposing differential duties (other than as allowed by "The Australian Colonies Duties Act, 1873"):
  - (5.) Any Bill the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon Us by Treaty:
  - (6.) Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of Our forces in the Colony by land
  - (7.) Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby Our prerogative, or the rights and property of Our subjects not residing in the Colony, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its Dependencies, may be prejudiced:
  - (8.) Any Bill containing provisions to which Our assent has been once refused, or which have been disallowed by Us:

Powers in Urgent Cases.

Unless such Bill shall contain a clause suspending the operation of such Bill until the signification. in the Colony of Our pleasure thereupon, or unless the Governor shall have satisfied himself that an urgent necessity exists requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation, in which case he is authorized to assent in Our name to such Bill, unless the same shall be repugnant to the law of England, or inconsistent with any obligations imposed upon Us by Treaty. But he is to transmit to Us, by the earliest opportunity, the Bill so assented to, together with his reasons for assenting thereto.

Laws sent home to have marginal Abstracts.

Journals and Minutes.

10. The Governor is to take care that all Laws assented to by him in Our name, or reserved for the signification of Our pleasure thereon, shall, when transmitted by him, be fairly abstracted in the margins, and be accompanied, in such cases as may seem to him necessary, with such explanatory observations as may be required to exhibit the reasons and occasions for proposing such laws, and shall also transmit fair copies of the Journals and Minutes of the proceedings of the Legislative Bodies of the Colony, which he is to require from the clerks or other public officers in that behalf of the said Legislative Bodies.

11. Whenever any offender shall have been condemned to suffer death by the sentence of any Regulation of Court, the Governor shall call upon the Judge who presided at the trial to make to him a written power of pardon in capital cases. Report of the case of such offender, and shall cause such Report to be taken into consideration at the Judges' Report to first meeting thereafter which may be conveniently held of the Executive Council, and he may cause Executive Counthe said Judge to be specially summoned to attend at such meeting, and to produce his notes thereat. cil. 12. The Governor is required, to the utmost of his power, to promote religion and education Promotion of among the native inhabitants of the Colony, and especially to take care to protect them in their persons, religion and education amongst and in the free enjoyment of their possessions, and by all lawful means to prevent and restrain all the Natives.

13. All Commissions granted by the Governor to any persons to be Judges, Justices of the Peace, Judges, &c., to be or other officers, shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during pleasure only.

- 14. The Governor shall forward to Us punctually from year to year, through one of Our Principal Blue Book. Secretaries of State, such annual returns as have been customarily transmitted to Us from the Colony relative to the revenue and expenditure, defence, public works, legislation, civil establishments pensions, populations, schools, course of exchange, imports and exports, agricultural produce, manufactures, and other matters in the said "Returns" more particular specified, with reference to the state and condition of the Colony.
- 15. The Governor shall not quit the Colony without having first obtained leave from Us for so Governor's doing, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, Temporary leave except for the purpose of visiting the Governor of any neighbouring Colony for periods not exceeding of absence. one month at any one time, nor exceeding in the aggregate one month for every year's service in the Colony.

16. The temporary absence of the Governor for any period not exceeding one month shall not, if Governor's he have previously informed Our Executive Council, in writing, of his intended absence, and if he have absence and departure from duly appointed a Deputy in accordance with Our said Letters Patent, be deemed a departure from the the Colony Colony within the meaning of the said Letters Patent.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To Our Chief Justice for the time being of Our Colony of New Zealand, or to the Senior Judge for the time being of Our said Colony, Greeting.

Recites Letters Patent constituting the Office of Governor. Providing for the Succession to the Government.

The Chief Justice trator of the Government in the absence of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor.

The Senior Judge to act as Administrator of the Government in the absence of the Chief Justice. Powers and Authorities to be exercised according to Instructions.

Senior Judge to resign the Government to when the latter is within the Colony and capable of administering. Officers and Administrator.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the Twenty-first day of February, 1879, in th Forty-second year of Our Reign, We did constitute, order, and declare that there should be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over Our Colony of New Zealand, and did authorize, empower, and command Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief to do and execute all things belonging to his said office as therein is more particularly set forth: And whereas by our said Letters Patent We did declare that, in the event of the death, incapacity, or removal of Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief or of his departure from the Colony, our Lieutenant Governor, or if there should be no such Officer in Our said Colony, then such person or persons as We might appoint under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, should during Our pleasure administer the Government of the same: to act as Adminis- Now know you that by this Our Commission, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, We do appoint you Our said Chief Justice for the time being, until Our further pleasure shall be signified, to administer the Government of Our said Colony of New Zealand in case of the death, incapacity, or removal or of the departure from the Colony, of Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief, as well as of Our Lieutenant Governor (if any), with all and singular the powers and authorities granted by Our said Letters Patent; and in case of the death, incapacity, or departure from Our said Colony of Our said Chief Justice for the time being, then We do appoint you, the Senior Judge for the time being of Our said Colony then residing therein, and not being under incapacity, to administer the Government thereof, with all the powers and authorities aforesaid. And We do hereby authorize and require you Our said Chief Justice or the said Senior Judge for the time being, as the case may be, to exercise and perform the said powers and authorities according to such Instructions as Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief or Our said Lieutenant Governor may have received from Us, and to such further Instructions as you may receive from Us, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State. And for so doing this shall be your Warrant.

Provided always that you, the Senior Judge, shall act in the administration of the Governm only when and so often as you, Our said Chief Justice, shall not be present within the Colony and the Chief Justice capable of administering the Government.

And We do hereby command all and singular Our Officers, Ministers, and loving subjects in Our said Colony, and all others whom it may concern, to take due notice hereof, and to give their ready others to obey the obedience accordingly.
