NEW ZEALAND CONSTABULARY

(ANNUAL REPORT ON).

Presented to both Houses of the General Assembly by Command of His Excellency.

Lieut.-Colonel READER to the Hon. the DEFENCE MINISTER.

Commissioner's Office, Wellington, 31st May, 1884. Sir,-I have the honour to submit to you a report, with statistics attached, of the Constabulary force for the year ending the 31st March, 1884.

2. The Police branch shows a strength on the 31st March of 465, being an increase of four on the previous year; the Field force 492, a decrease of 142 on the previous year. The distribution of both branches is shown in attached returns.

3. In the above strength of the Police are not included 26 Native constables, at reduced

salaries, ranging from £20 to £100 per annum.

4. The casualties in the Police branch amount to 44, as against 59 of the previous year, made up as follows: Resignations 32, discharges 10 (three of which were on compensation, and one for medical unfitness), dismissals 2.

5. By the criminal statistics attached, an increase of minor offences in the North Island, to

the extent of 406, is shown; and a decrease in the South Island of 244.

6. The statistics of drunkenness for past year show an increase in Canterbury of 211 cases, in Otago of 204, in Wellington of 165, in Auckland of 112, in Nelson of 30, and in Westland of 6; and a decrease of 31 in Hawke's Bay, and 29 in Taranaki.

7. I have given below, for your information, a return showing the proportion of police to population, and cost per inhabitant of this and adjoining colonies, showing the comparison favourable

to New Zealand.

8. I am happy to be able to report most favourably of the general good conduct of the members of the force, and the zeal and energy disployed by both officers and men in the discharge of their multifarious duties outside actual police work, in connection with enforcing the by-laws of local

multifarious duties outside actual police work, in connection with enforcing the by-laws of local bodies, as enumerated in former reports.

9. With respect to the Field force, in consequence of the harbour beacons erected by Captain Fairchild, of the "Hinemoa," having been destroyed by the Natives, a detachment of Constabulary, consisting of three officers and 111 men, under command of Major Tuke, with camp equipage complete, and provisions for two months, was despatched in the "Hinemoa" to Kawhia, in the early part of October last, to establish a Constabulary post on the north shore of the harbour, for the protection of the new beacons to be erected by Captain Fairchild, in lieu of those that had been destroyed. I visited the post shortly after in the "Hinemoa," taking with me, under your instructions, two troop horses, with a view of establishing a regular communication with Alexandra, and the materials for a small blockhouse, to enable a few men to protect the camp, should the main the materials for a small blockhouse, to enable a few men to protect the camp, should the main body be required for service outside of it. I found the camp pitched on an elevation, selected by you, commanding the Government reserve of 44 acres, where our landing had to be effected. Nothing could have been more friendly than the understanding which appeared to exist between the Natives and our men, notably on the part of the chief Hone te One, who, I found, had not only sent supplies to the camp, but had made over to Major Tuke a piece of cultivated ground, well fenced, as a kitchen-garden for the men, and also a fenced paddock of some forty acres for the run of any horses we might require. Major Tuke, and the officers under him, deserve great credit for the arrangements they had already made for the comfort of their men. On my return to Wellington I was authorized by you to forward materials for the erection of a reading-room for the use of the men, a supply of books from the Constabulary library, and garden seeds; and this was accordingly done by the next trip of the "Hinemoa." The materials for a six-roomed house for the accommodation of the commanding officer, and to assist his subaltern officers in the erection of their huts, were forwarded shortly afterwards. The necessary carpenters' work was done by members of the translation of the translation of the control of the Constabulary in the force brought up to the trade. In the course of the general reduction of the Constabulary in the quarter ending the 31st March, the strength of the Kawhia detachment was reduced from 114 of all ranks to seventy-nine. On leaving Kawhia I proceeded to New Plymouth by the "Hinemoa," and from there overland through Lieut.-Colonel Roberts's district, that officer meeting me at Pungarehu, now reduced to a post of twenty men, who occupy the blockhouse which was erected

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when Pungarehu was our principal advanced camp. We then visited the Parihaka detachment, at when Pungarenu was our principal advanced camp. We then visited the Parihaka detachment, at that time consisting of two officers and sixty-five constables, under the command of Major Goring. Much work had been done since I last visited the post in comfortably hutting the men; and I found everything clean, orderly, and a credit to that officer. The next post visited was Opunake, the head-quarters of the district. This, like all other posts, had been greatly reduced in strength, numbering only fifty-nine of all ranks. The redoubt and barrack accommodation were in excellent order, and the men presented, as at the two former posts in Lieut.-Colonel Roberts's command, that orderly and cleanly appearance which proves their being well looked after in their training. I visited the post at Manaia, which completed the inspection of Lieut.-Colonel Roberts's district. This post had been reduced to seventeen men, occupying the valuable redoubt erected by the commanding officer, Captain Gudgeon. All expenses connected with Lieut.-Colonel Roberts's district have been reduced to the lowest workable limits, and every assistance has been given by that officer in this direction.

10. In the early part of March, under your instructions, I proceeded to Tauranga, to make arrangements for abolishing the Opotiki District as an independent one, on the retirement of Major Swindley from its command, and attaching it to the Taupo District, under command of Major Scannell. The old arrangement of keeping it a separate district was no longer necessary, as it was easier and cheaper for Major Scannell to work part of it, the Wairoa for instance, from Taupo than it had been from Tauranga. Of course this extended district could not be worked alone by Major Scannell; I therefore made the arrangements, approved by you, of stationing Captain Baker at Tauranga, to take charge of the northern subdistrict as far as Opotiki. This enabled me to effect

considerable reductions in the working of the new district.

11. Agreeably to instructions from you, I then proceeded to the Waikato, with a view to closing Cambridge as a Constabulary station. I reached Cambridge on the 24th March, and immediately made arrangements for transferring the men at that post to Kihikihi and Alexandra, establishing Kihikihi as the head-quarters. In the few days I could spare to remain in the district I visited Kihikihi and Alexandra, with a view of arranging for working-parties being immediately available for the formation of the Alexandra-Kawhia Road, on the application of Mr. Hursthouse, the Engineer in charge. Before leaving Cambridge, my instructions to take down and remove all movable buildings to Kihikihi were being carried out, and the work promised to be completed within two months.

12. It is very gratifying to me to be in a position to speak most highly of the general conduct of all the members of the Field force. When it recently was found necessary to reduce the number by eighty men, it was decided as the fairest way to select by defaulter-sheets, and then by the juniors. The defaulter-sheets could not supply the number.

13. The casualties during the past year were 165, made up as follow: Transfers to Militia staff, 2; to Prisons Department, 1; recruits to police, 13; resignations, 64; reduction of force, 72; expiration of service, 1; discharges, 4; dismissals, 4; medical unfitness, 3; and death, 1.
