PRINTING AND STATIONERY DEPARTMENT

I have the honour to submit the following report on the operations of the Printing and Stationery Department for the year 1885:—

DEPARTMENTAL RETURNS.

The usual balance-sheet and departmental returns for 1885 have been prepared and will be found appended to this report. I am glad to be able to show a profit to credit of colony of £6,788 10s. 4d., notwithstanding the fact that during the past year a large portion of the work, such as the reprint of *Hansard*, was of an exceptionally solid and unremunerative character.

The return of the number of employés during each month of the year shows a more equable result as compared with former years. The difference between the minimum and maximum number was 38, while in the previous year it was 54. The monthly average was 137, as against 129 for the previous year.

MACHINERY, ETC.

During the past year steps have been taken to replace some of the machines in use by others of a more modern type and likely to prove more suitable to our requirements. The large four-feeder machine has been disposed of at a satisfactory advance on the price originally paid for it, and, on the arrival of the new machines ordered, I propose disposing of two others, one of which has been in constant use for the last twenty years. These old machines have recently undergone some costly repairs, but I consider it inadvisable to continue expending money upon them as the amount could be much more satisfactorily invested in the purchase of new machinery. The machines under order are being obtained from Messrs. Dawson and Son, London, and may be expected to arrive in Wellington by the next direct steamer. The order comprises two double-royal, one double-demy, and one demy Wharfdale printing machines; one foolscap folio Arab platen machine, and one of Dawson's self-clamp cutting machines.

Additional ruling and wire book-sewing machines and hydraulic presses are wanted for the binding-room, but cannot be obtained until accommodation is provided for them in the new office.

HANSARD.

The number of subscribers during 1885 was 720, being less by about one-half than that for 1884. As I have previously pointed out, the large free issue made by members, and to all newspapers, public libraries, and local bodies, deters many from subscribing who would otherwise pay the small fee demanded.

Steady progress has been made in the printing of the early debates from 1854 to 1866, which are reprinted from the newspaper reports of the period. The debates will occupy five volumes in all, four of which are printed, containing the proceedings up to the end of 1863. The last volume will embrace the years 1864–66, and will, I trust, be ready for issue during next recess.

TELEGRAPH FORMS.

Tenders were invited during last year, both in London and in this colony, for the printing of sixteen millions of telegraph forms; in response to which five tenders were received from London and nine from New Zealand firms. I am glad to be able to state that the tender from this department was accepted, being the lowest by £94 15s. 2d. The order has been duly completed, and I have the satisfaction of stating that, while the work was performed in the colony instead of in London as hitherto, the actual cost of production was well within my estimate. Arrangements have been made for executing an order for another sixteen millions of forms on the same terms for the coming year.

THE STEREOTYPE BRANCH.

The number of stereotype plates produced last year was 1,242, and of electrotypes 660. A considerable amount of leads of various sizes were also cast for the use of the office. The number of rubber stamps manufactured in this branch for the various departments of the Government was 221.

The railway-ticket printing for all Government lines, which is performed in this department, shows an increase over last year. The numbers were: Railway tickets, 2,425,240; season tickets, 10,517; flag-station tickets, 63,400; lost-luggage tickets, 35,000; weighbridge tickets, 19,000. The printing of the railway tickets required 11,701 separate alterations, being an average of one alteration to every 207 tickets. The number of stations for which tickets have to be printed is 578.

The manufacture of electrotypes for postage and beer-duty stamps is carried on in this branch. During the past year two new plates of postage and one of beer-duty stamps have been executed.

A set of designs for postage stamps for Tonga and Samoa are now being engraved by Mr. Bock, of Wellington, from which electrotypes will be prepared in this department.

STATIONERY STORE.

The number of requisitions received and complied with during the past year was 11,779, or at the rate of 37 per day. The number of separate items in the requisitions was 60,668.

The receipts from the sale of official publications amounted to £1,689 3s. 10d. The quantity of waste paper shipped during the year was 51 tons, representing in value £127 10s. The Dunedin paper-mill takes all I can supply at 50s. per ton.
