Education Office, Timaru, 25th February, 1890. I have the honour to submit the following report on the District High Schools of Waimate Sir.—

Fifteen scholars took part in the examination at Waimate, and nine at Temuka. Miss Gertrude A. Brown, one of the Temuka scholars, has been successful in passing the matriculation examination of the New Zealand University.
