Presented to both Houses of the General Assembly by Command of His Excellency.

SIR,—

Government House, Wellington, 8th July, 1896.

I have the honour to bring to your notice that, having informed the Secretary of State on accepting the appointment I have the honour to hold that for private reasons I would be unable to retain it for more than five years, my term of office will accordingly expire on the 8th of April, 1897, as I have drawn salary since the same date in 1892.

In case there is no official record of my intimation to that effect, which, as far as I am concerned, was verbal only, I beg respectfully to be allowed to resign my office at the expiration of the term of five years, to take effect on the above-mentioned date.
