ROTORUA.

ROTORUA WATER-SUPPLY.

THE race has been generally repaired and cleaned periodically, inside and out, and 150 ft. of new fluming has been made. The timber is showing signs of decay, and will need constant attention and repairs. The settling-tanks have been cleaned every week. The supply has been extended to the Postmaster Bath by 40 chains of 2 in. galvanised-iron pipe; at Whakarewarewa, by 165 ft. of 1 in. pipe; at the caretaker's cottage, Whakarewarewa, by 75 ft. of $\frac{3}{4}$ in. pipe; at the Pavilion Bath by 85 ft. of $\frac{3}{4}$ in. pipe; and by 200 ft. at the road surveyor's office. Also, five new 8 in. main pipes, representing 45 ft., have been put in in place of old ones decayed by action of the acids in the ground.

The supply, as far as it at present extends, has been ample during the recent exceedingly dry season. A report has been submitted to you on its extension to meet the requirements of the new township.

The number of services now being taken from the main are ninety-one, the revenue for the year being £120 5s. and the expenditure £343 19s. 7d.

The various Government departments, including the Railway, are supplied gratis.
