The National Patriotic Fund Board has the honour to present its annual report and balance-sheet for the year ended 30th September, 1947.

1. Introduction

The year under review was concerned mainly with the realization of assets, the care of the sick and wounded, and the consideration of future policy as regards patriotic funds, as well as with the provision of welfare for the remaining Service personnel overseas and in New Zealand.

The annual gross expenditure of the Board since its inception, exclusive of expenditure by Provincial Patriotic Councils, was as follows:

3. Work by Expending Agents

General

The Board ceased to provide welfare from patriotic funds for Service personnel in New Zealand as at 31st March, 1947. As regards overseas personnel, from that date the cost of welfare was met from funds made available from art-union profits. At the 31st March, 1947, the Church of England Military Affairs Committee and the Y.M.C.A. War Services Committee were the only expending agents of the Board engaged in welfare work in camps and Air and Naval stations. In addition, the Y.M.C.A. continued to operate the recreation huts at Domain Hospital, Auckland, and Rotorua, Hutt, and Wellington Hospitals until their control was vested in the Joint Council of the Order of St. John and the New Zealand Red Cross Society.

The Board feels that it cannot speak too highly of the work of its expending agents, who did so much to make the patriotic effort of this country the success which it undoubtedly was.

Both the Y.M.C.A. and the Church of England Military Affairs Committee since the early days of the war had provided welfare for Service personnel overseas and in New Zealand from funds made available by the Board. Their unremitting service is warmly appreciated by the Board, as is also the work of those many citizens associated with these organizations who gave their time and labour in this important work.

Joint Council of the Order of St. John and New Zealand Red Cross Society

The work of this organization as expending agent of the Board in the care of sick and wounded personnel was continued during the year and extended to include the conduct of the recreational huts attached to the hospitals. In addition to the provision of welfare which includes distribution of cigarettes, tobacco, fruit, &c., and outings for the patients, a most important phase is that of diversional and occupational therapy. By teaching the arts and handicrafts to the men in hospital by various processes, a valuable adjunct to the well-being of patients is provided as well as, in many cases, equipping them with a means of livelihood on their discharge.

New Zealand Navy League War Council

The work of the New Zealand Navy League War Council as expending agent of the Board concluded on 30th September, 1947. The Council was entrusted with the provision of comforts for the men of the Navy, and the success of its efforts is evidenced by the many letters of appreciation received from these men. The Board desires to express its thanks to the Navy League for its part in this patriotic work.

New Zealand Lady Galway Guild

The Lady Galway Guild was formed in 1940 to provide second-hand clothing and footwear for refugees in Great Britain.

Branches were formed throughout New Zealand to receive the clothing, recondition it where necessary, and pack it for despatch overseas. The organization forwarded 9,011 cases of clothing up to the end of December, 1946, when it disbanded. The Board desires to pay a tribute to all those persons who assisted in this work, which was the means of bringing so much comfort to the needy in Great Britain.

4. Work Overseas

The Board continued to supply welfare for Service personnel in Japan, United Kingdom, Fiji, and Norfolk Island up to 31st March, 1947, from patriotic funds, and thereafter out of funds provided from art-union profits.

Expenditure on troops overseas amounted to £28,238, of which £18,000 was a charge

against patriotic funds.

United Kingdom

Bursars.—In August, 1947, a special committee was set up in London to consider applications from rehabilitation bursars in England in need of financial assistance. It is the intention of the committee to place the bursars on the same basis in relation to medical treatment as they would be in New Zealand and to assist them in other directions where necessary.

New Zealand War Services Association.—This Association, which commenced activities in October, 1939, ceased operation on 31st October, 1946. It had been instrumental in setting up clubs and providing recreational facilities for thousands of New Zealand personnel. The Board is indebted to the Association for its contribution of £6.000 sterling to the patriotic funds upon its disbandment.

Australia

The major task of providing outings for visiting personnel and welfare for New Zealand troops stationed in Australia has now finished, though special provision has been made to render assistance to "J" Force personnel who are detained in Australia for any reason.

A number of grants have been made during the year to ex-servicemen in need of

financial assistance.

5. FOOD FOR BRITAIN

Of an amount of £75,000 set aside in the books of the Board for the purchase of food for Britain, some £55,000 has been spent on foodstuffs which would not otherwise have been allocated to the United Kingdom. The following goods have been purchased and despatched to the Ministry of Food, London, for distribution mainly to orphanages, institutions, old-aged pensioners, and disabled persons:—

6. FUTURE OF PATRIOTIC AND CANTEEN FUNDS

Conferences between the ex-Service organizations, the Provincial Patriotic Councils, and the Board were held during the year in connection with the proposal of the Board that canteen profits be amalgamated with the National Patriotic Fund for the benefit of ex-Service personnel, and also in regard to the future policy in connection with this Fund. It was agreed to recommend that legislation be enacted to establish two Boards, one to administer canteen profits and the other to administer the National Patriotic Fund, with a common Secretariat, the Canteen Fund to be controlled by nine ex-servicemen nominated by the six established ex-Service Organizations, and to ensure co-ordination of effort and avoid overlapping the members of the Canteen Trust Board to form part of the National Patriotic Fund Board. Additional members of the latter Board to be—

His Excellency the Governor-General, Chairman.

The Under-Secretary, Department of Internal Affairs.

One representative of each of the fourteen Provincial Patriotic Councils.

Five members to be nominated by the present Board.

The provincial funds to continue to be administered by the separate Provincial Councils.

7. WAR VETERANS' HOMES

Proposals for the establishment of a war veterans' home or homes in New Zealand were considered, and a committee set up to study the advisability and desirability of establishing such a home. The committee has done a considerable amount of preliminary work.

8. Realization of Assets

The sum of £53,515 was realized during the year, mainly from the sale of huts, furniture, and equipment in New Zealand.

9 SECRETARY

Mr. G. A. Hayden, who had been on sick-leave for some months, retired from the position of Secretary-Treasurer to the Board in April, 1947. He had held these positions since the inception of the Board, and much of the success of the patriotic effort of the Dominion has been due to his untiring efforts and organizing ability.

Mr. Havden has been appointed a member of the Board.

10. Appreciation

The Board again desires to express its appreciation of the co-operation and assistance given by the Patriotic Councils and their committees and welfare organizations throughout New Żealand.

It also wishes to thank its representatives overseas and its expending agents overseas and in New Zealand. Thanks are also due to the Government Departments which assisted it in its work, and to the Service chiefs and to the press.

Finally, the Board desires to thank its office staff for the loyal and efficient service rendered, and the Government for meeting the office salaries and rent and for assistance in other respects.
