- (k) Last year's provision covered nine months' charge only.
- (l) By international agreement two-thirds of this expenditure is recoverable from the Commonwealth of Australia and United Kingdom Governments while one-third is borne by the New Zealand Government.
- (m) It was expected that receipts amounting to £163,000 (approximate) due from the United Kingdom and Australian Governments in respect of the operation of the International Airport. Fiji, would have been received by 31st March, 1949.
