The proportion of dead or unclaimed letters, letter-cards, and post-cards to the total number dealt with in the colony was 0.34 per cent., as against 0.28 per cent. in 1899.

23,735 book-packets and circulars were returned to foreign countries. 61,045 were returned to senders through the Dead-letter Office; 38,514 were returned by Chief Postmasters: a total of 123,294 book-packets and circulars, as compared with 113,343 in 1899.

382 letters were wrongly addressed; 25 letters were discovered to have been posted with

previously used stamps; 1,840 unclaimed registered letters were dealt with.

2,256 newspapers and 1,352 books and other articles without addresses were received, many of which were subsequently applied for and delivered.

798 newspapers were returned to the publishers.

472 letters and 149 letter-cards were posted without addresses.

Representing a total of

10 letters with libellous addresses were intercepted.
