Your letter of 18th November addressed to the Prime Minister of Canada: Terms proposed, Pacific Cable Board to pay Canadian Pacific Railway \$55,000 per annum for exclusive use of line from Montreal to Bamfield; railway company to supply and maintain a copper wire two hundred and ten pounds per mile, also to grant, if available, free of charge office accommodation for Pacific Cable Board staff at Montreal, and all Pacific Cable Board repeating-stations and other minor details. This will entail further annual expenditure of £6,700 for one year, and following year about £4,500, based on present receipts, reduced annually if traffic increased. Have reason to think that arrangements being made on these lines, and it appears to me most practical way of meeting difficulty. Have you any objection?

The Board's scheme should provide an efficient service at much less cost than for a new Government line, and without delay, and they much hope you may consider this arrangement would satisfactorily meet the object you have in view.
