Return to an Order of the House of Representatives dated the 3rd August, 1910.

Ordered, "That there be laid before this House a return from the different Education Boards, and for each of the last four years, showing,—(1) The amount per head paid to the School Committees, giving the variation in amount due to the size of the school; also the conditions—as, for example, caretakers' residences—which affect the amount paid, and showing the years in which the special ninepenny capitation was paid: (2) a statement of what each Board expects the School Committees to do with the moneys paid to them by the Board; also giving any variations in what the Boards have expected from the School Committees during the above period."—(Mr. ALLEN.)

VARIATIONS IN WHAT THE BOARDS HAVE EXPECTED FROM THE SCHOOL COMMITTEES.

DURING THE PERIOD 1906-9 (INCLUSIVE).

THE several Education Boards report as follows:--

Auckland.—No change during this period.

Taranaki.—Has reduced Committees' share of the repairs.

Wanganui.—No change.

Wellington.—No change in the regulations, but their application has been relaxed: Board now does more repairs, allows separate capitation for each school building and for temporary buildings, provides furniture-renewals and sanitary buckets, pays accident insurance for cleaners.

Hawke's Bay.—Committees do not now supply "appliances."

Marlborough.—Scale of allowances was increased in 1908, and certain stationery has been

supplied by the Board since that date.

Nelson.—Board now pays bank charges, and gives additional grants for fuel to country schools, except schools of Grade 0.

Grey.—Committees now pay cost of outgoing postage.

Westland .- No change.

North Canterbury.—No change: but there is a tendency to lessen Committees' responsibilities.

South Canterbury.—No change, except that there has been a decrease in the repairs required to be done by Committees, as Board's workmen now do many repairs formerly done by Committees.

Otago.—No change; but it is remarked that in the case of some large schools the allowances are not enough to pay for cleaning and fuel.

Southland .- No change.

REGULATIONS OF THE AUCKLAND EDUCATION BOARD. School Fund.

1. The School Fund consists of (1) moneys granted out of the Board Fund; (2) donations, subscriptions, and all other moneys which may be granted to the Committee for the purposes of the Act. All such donations and subscriptions should be included in the Committee's accounts.

2. The grant from the Board Fund consists of an allowance regulated quarterly according to the following scale by the average attendance at the school. Payments are made quarterly in advance, according to the ascertained average for the preceding quarter.

4. Committees should forward to the bank the signatures of the members authorized to sign

cheques upon the account.

School Buildings.

5. It is the duty of Committees to make proper provision for the cleaning of the schoolrooms and offices. The schoolrooms and furniture should be swept and dusted daily, and washed as often as they are found to need washing. The windows also should be kept clean. Fuel should be provided in the winter. The School Fund is intended primarily to defray these expenses.

6. It is the duty of Committees to exercise a general supervision over the school buildings, to do all in their power to protect the buildings and furniture from damage, and to cause any

small repairs to be made at the cost of the School Fund.

- 7. In regard to the use of the school building for other than school purposes, Committees should not allow the school to be so used when there is another building in the district available; and they should insist that no damage be done to the school building, fittings, or furniture; that the schoolroom be left thoroughly clean, the furniture replaced, and the key returned in good time to the teacher.
- 8. The Board disapproves of the schoolroom being used as a dancing-school or for frequent dancing assemblies.
- 9. Committees are recommended to have school buildings funnigated as a means of preventing the spread of infectious diseases when prevalent in the neighbourhood.
- 10. Subject to the approval of the Committee, the schoolroom may be used as a polling-booth for public elections, and the teacher may act as Returning Officer in such cases.

School Stationery.

11. The following stationery is to be supplied for the use of scholars in the public schools: Ink, pens, penholders, slates, slate-pencils, pencil-holders, lead pencils, crasers, chalk, foolscap paper, and blotting-paper.

12. These articles are to be procured and supplied by the School Committee of the district, in such manner as they may direct, and in quantities sufficient to meet the requirements of each

school.

13. The articles are to be supplied free of charge for the use of scholars in school. They are not to be used for home work, nor must they on any account be removed from the school.

14. Committees and teachers are requested to certify in the monthly certificate for each month that there is an adequate supply of stationery in the school.

Miscellaneous.

15. Committees are requested to exert their influence in upholding the teacher's authority in the school, and to assist and protect the teacher in the discharge of his duties.

16. The course of instruction is regulated under the provisions of the Act.

17. Parents or guardians must not be allowed to interfere in school matters. If they have any complaint to make, they must make it not to the teacher personally, nor in school, nor in the presence of the pupils, but in writing to the Committee, whose duty it will be to investigate the complaint.

18. It is the duty of the Chairman of the Committee, or of some other member duly authorized by the Committee, to sign the teacher's monthly certificate and quarterly return, and also

to countersign all requisitions for school furniture and appliances.

- 19. Committees are reminded that there is no power to close schools unless in very exceptional circumstances. Schools should not be closed for more than one day without the authority of the
- 20. Committees are requested to render all possible assistance to the Board in obtaining accurate returns of attendance—(1) by from time to time inspecting and revising the register of attendance, which is open to their inspection at the school; (2) by carefully examining the returns when presented by the teacher for signature and approval; (3) by seeing that the returns are forwarded to the Board at the earliest possible opportunity.

REGULATIONS OF THE TARANAKI EDUCATION BOARD.

School Property.

55. The school-site, buildings, fencing, and all appliances are legally vested in the Board as public property, and cannot be sold or otherwise disposed of without the consent of the Board.

56. The Secretary of the Board shall have charge of the furniture of any school which is

closed or is being removed.

57. Committees are expected to exercise a general supervision over school buildings, and to

do all in their power to protect the buildings and furniture from damage.

58. Committees must not allow the school to be used for other than school purposes when another building in the district is available. When the building is used, they must insist that the school be left thoroughly clean, the furniture replaced, the key returned in good time to the teacher, and that, if any damage be done to the buildings, fittings, or furniture, the damage be made good. Committees are authorized to make a charge not exceeding 10s. on each occasion of using, to cover the cost of cleaning after use.

59. A School Committee shall not allow dancing in any school under its jurisdiction, except it be for the express purpose of raising money (1) to augment the School Fund, (2) to provide prizes for school-children. Where dancing is allowed for purposes other than the above, the contributions to the Committee's funds may be withheld by the Board.

60. Head teachers are requested to make known to their Committees any necessity which may arise for effecting repairs to the school buildings, furniture, &c. Teachers are expected to take a direct interest in maintaining the school buildings and premises in becoming order, especially when such can be done at the expense of slight personal effort.

61. If anything pertaining to a school or building is negligently lost or wilfully destroyed, the teacher must at once report to the Committee, so that action may be taken to recover the amount of damage, and a copy of the teacher's letter to the Committee must be written in the log-book.

62. Teachers shall particularly attend to the proper ventilation of their class-rooms, and shall do what lies in their power to secure the maintenance of the school buildings, furniture, offices, and grounds in the tidiest manner possible, and shall exercise all due care to preserve the buildings, furniture, fencing, &c., from being injured. The Inspectors are specially enjoined to take note of the manner in which this rule is attended to by the several teachers.

63. Residences are for the use of head teachers, and cannot without the express sanction of the Board be let to, or occupied by, any other persons. When such sanction is obtained, the head teachers shall be held responsible for any injury to the residence, fences, grounds, &c., beyond

fair wear-and-tear, and shall provide for such insurance as the Board may direct.

64. Head teachers are expected to keep their residences, and the fences and hedges about their residences, in good order, and to keep the grounds attached to the residences free from weeds, &c. The Inspectors are specially enjoined to take note of the manner in which this rule

is attended to by head teachers.

65. All grounds attached to a school are intended primarily for the use of the pupils, and, should there be more than enough for their needs, the head teacher shall have the right to use the A Committee may, however, with the consent of the Board, by letting or leasing any portion of the grounds make such arrangements as may be deemed expedient in the interests of the school. In all such cases, however, the head teacher shall be consulted, and any revenue derived from such letting or leasing shall form part of the funds of the Board.

66. All requisitions for school furniture and appliances must be made in writing, and must be signed by the head teacher and countersigned by the Chairman of Committee, and, in order that such requisition may be more expeditiously dealt with, teachers should call the attention of

the Inspector to their requirements when he makes his visit to the school.

School Fund.

67. There shall be a fund known as the "School Fund" in connection with every school under the Board's control.

68. The Committee of each district for the time being has charge of such fund.

69. The School Fund consists of,

(a.) Money granted out of the Board Fund from time to time.

(b.) Donations, subscriptions, and all moneys that may be obtained by the Committee for educational purposes.

Incidental Expenses of Schools.

70. The Board shall, by quarterly instalments, contribute every year to the "School Fund" of the several schools the sums set down in the following scale:

When the average attendance is 30 and under, 7s. 6d. each on the average attendance. Over 30 and not exceeding 50, 7s. 6d. each for the first 30, and 3s. 9d. each for all over 30. Over 50 and not exceeding 100, 6s. each for the first 50, and 3s. each for all over 50.

Over 100 and not exceeding 300, 4s. 6d. each for the first 100, and 4s. each for all over 100.

Over 300, 4s. 6d. each for the first 100, 4s. each for the next 200, and 3s. 6d. each for all over 300.

Where any school is connected with an efficient sewage system the rate to be paid to Committees shall be 9d. per head less than the above rates.

71. The following services shall be a first charge on the "School Fund": viz., cleaning the school and grounds; providing proper sanitary conveniences, lavatory, and suitable requirements; water for the use of the children; effecting minor repairs to school buildings and fencing,

and supplying firewood for the use of the schools.

72. In addition to the ordinary capitation grant, the Board will assist by subsidy all voluntary subscriptions collected locally by a Committee for the improvement of the school grounds and buildings, or for the purchase of useful apparatus or appliances for the school; but in all cases special application must be made to the Board in writing, and full particulars of the work required and an estimate of the cost given before any expenditure in this direction can be incurred by a Committee. The Board will not hold itself responsible for any liabilities incurred unless its sanction has first been obtained.

73. The schoolroom is to be well swept out and the furniture dusted daily.

74. Tanks must be cleaned out at least every six months, and chimneys must be swept

75. The school floor is to be washed with hot water, soap, and disinfectant at least once a

The desks and forms are to be washed with hot water and soap when required.

76. During the winter months firewood, split and ready for use, is to be provided and delivered by the Committee, at the request of the teacher. When required, the fires should be lit before the school opens for the day.

77. In the event of any School Committee neglecting to make proper arrangements for any of the services chargeable on the School Fund, the Board may, on such neglect being reported to the Board, suspend payment of its contribution to the School Fund until such neglect is remedied.

78. Committees shall provide paper, ink, pens, chalk, &c., for school use, and to defray the

cost may authorize the teachers to collect 6d. per quarter from children above Standard I.
79. Committees are requested to exert their influence in upholding the teacher's authority in the school, and to assist and protect the teacher in the discharge of his duties.

80. The duties of teachers being defined generally by the Board's regulations, it is not considered desirable that Committees should interfere with the procedure and discipline of schools. If any change in school procedure is considered necessary, the Board's approval should be obtained before any action is taken.

81. In order that Committees' accounts may be clearly kept and expeditiously audited, attention is drawn to the following: Each Committee must keep a proper account of its receipts and expenditure, and render a clear and correct balance-sheet at the end of the year (31st March) on a form provided for that purpose. Any Committee which may be in doubt as to the most desirable mode of keeping its books and accounts will receive every information and assistance on application to the Secretary, who will, if necessary, furnish specimen copies showing how the entries should be made. Only such moneys as are manipulated by the Committees are to be entered on the balance-sheets referred to. Payments made by the Board through the medium of the Committees, for which detailed vouchers are required, are not to be entered in the annual statements. Committees should, however, keep separate memoranda of such sums for their own guidance. No money is to be taken from the capitation allowance for prizes or school treats.

82. The principal moneys which the Committees are to render an account of are (a) the School

Fund, (b) donations, (c) subscriptions, and net proceeds of any entertainments, &c.

83. As the whole of the Committees' accounts for the year have to be summarized by the Secretary and forwarded to the Department, Committees are particularly requested to see that their accounts are correctly balanced, and forwarded to the Secretary early in April.

REGULATIONS OF THE WANGANUI EDUCATION BOARD. School Fund.

4. What it consists of .- The School Fund consists of (1) moneys granted out of the Board Fund to the Committees; (2) donations, subscriptions, and all other moneys which may be granted to the Committee for the purposes of the Education Act, except moneys subscribed for school prizes, picnics, &c.

5. How computed .- The grant from the Board Fund to the School Fund shall be computed on the average daily attendance for the year ending 31st December preceding, and shall be paid to the Committee at the end of each quarter. Payment, however, may be withheld pending the

audit of the annual balance-sheet.

6. Scale.—The following is the scale upon which the grant from the Board Fund will be made :-

7. Manner of expending.—The sums contributed to the School Fund under the above scale are intended to meet the cost of cleaning school buildings and premises, sweeping chimneys, providing fuel for schoolrooms, making all necessary minor repairs to schools buildings, premises, and fences, improving school grounds, and the expenses incurred in connection with the Committee's meetings and correspondence, pens, penholders, ink and pencils for the pupils' use in

school, and writing-paper, drawing-paper, and blotting-paper for examinations.

8. Subsidies. (a.) Board's: To encourage Committees to improve the condition of the schools and grounds under their charge, the Board will be prepared to consider subsidizing at the rate of £1 for £1 all the moneys raised locally and expended wholly on the undermentioned works: Asphalting grounds, renewal of fencing of school premises and glebes, painting and papering interior of residences, painting and distempering the interior of schools, erecting shelter-sheds, fencing and preparing school gardens. A subsidy shall on no account be paid unless the Board's sanction to the expenditure has been obtained prior to the works being carried out, and all applications for such sanction must be accompanied by a full statement of the proposed works and an estimate of their cost. (b.) Department's: A subsidy of £1 for £1 is paid by the Department to all district high schools on moneys raised locally; and a pound-for-pound subsidy is also paid to all schools on contributions made in material, or money locally raised for the purpose of establishing or improving recognized school gardens.

9. Accounts.-(1.) Each School Committee must keep a proper account of its receipts and expenditure, and render a clear and correct balance-sheet at the end of the year (31st March) on a form provided for the purpose. Any School Committee which may be in doubt as to the most desirable mode of keeping its books and accounts will receive every information and assistance on application to the Secretary of the Board, who will, if necessary, furnish specimen copies showing how the entries should be made. Only such moneys as are included in the School Fund by the Committee should be entered in the balance-sheet. Payments made by the Board through the medium of the Committee, for which vouchers giving details of the items charged for are required, are not to be entered in the annual statements. Committees should, however, keep separate memoranda of such sums for their own guidance. No money is to be taken from the

School Fund for prizes or school treats.

(2.) Committees' accounts shall be audited at the Board's office, and Committees are enjoined to see that their accounts are properly balanced and despatched, accompanied by detailed vouchers, to the Secretary for audit not later than the 5th day of April in each year.

(3.) Payments on account of work: Before any payment can be made on account of building or other work executed by authority of the Board it is necessary that a certificate from the Board's architect, or from some competent person approved by the Board, be forwarded to the Secretary, with a voucher for the amount on the form provided for the purpose. Vouchers for such payments must first be placed before the local School Committee, to be properly passed and certified by the Chairman. When contributions by Committees, outside of the School Fund, are subsidized by the Board, vouchers showing the liability incurred will be required before the Board's subsidy is paid.

School Buildings and Property.

10. Supervision by School Committees .- School buildings, furniture, and grounds are under the care of the School Committees, whose duty it is to exercise a general supervision over them, to do all in their power to protect them from damage, and to cause any small repairs to be made at the cost of the School Fund.

11. Particulars as to Repairs .- The Board will make no grant for repairs without being first furnished by the School Committee with full particulars of the work required and an estimate

of the cost.

12. Moneys not claimed.—Except for works in progress, sums of money voted by the Board,

but not claimed within six months, will not be paid unless a fresh application is made.

13. Provision for cleaning Rooms.—It is the duty of the Committee to make proper provision for the cleaning of the school building and offices. The rooms and furniture should be swept and dusted daily, and washed as often as they are found to need washing, at least once per month. The windows also should be kept clean. Fuel should be provided, and care should be taken that there is an ample supply of pure drinking-water for the use of the children. The School Fund is intended primarily to defray these expenses.

14. Use of School Buildings for other than School Purposes .- (1.) In regard to the use of the school buildings for other than school purposes, Committees should not allow the buildings to be so used when there is another building in the district available. Should, however, necessity arise for such use of a building, the Committee interested should insist that no damage be done to the grounds, buildings, fittings, or furniture; that the rooms be left thoroughly clean, the furniture properly replaced, and the key returned in good time to the head teacher. The furniture and

appliances shall on no account be removed outside the school buildings. (2.) If the frequent use of the school buildings for other than school purposes is calculated to injure the cause of education, the Board may deem it necessary to close the school. Committees are reminded that the head teacher has special charge of the school furniture, and that if he

allows it to sustain material injury he is liable to lose his appointment.

15. Damage by Pupils.—Pupils wilfully defacing or injuring fences, building, or furniture render themselves liable to expulsion from their school. Desks should be kept free from ink-stains and scratches. When window-panes are broken, the cost of mending should be defrayed by the delinquent. Any repairs which may be necessary should be reported by head teachers to their Committees, and repairs in all cases should be effected without delay. At the same time, teachers are reminded that a slight personal effort on their part may often obviate the necessity of appealing to the Committee and putting that body to needless expense

16. Dancing in School Buildings .- Schoolrooms are not to be used for dancing.

17. Fumigation.—Committees are recommended to have school buildings fumigated by the Public Health Officer, as a means of preventing the spread of infectious diseases when such are prevalent in the neighbourhood, and the Board will defray the cost.

18. Glebe.—When a sufficient amount of ground has been apportioned for the purposes of a playground, school garden, and accommodation paddock for the pupils' horses, the remainder of the glebe shall be held to be in the occupancy of the teacher, unless otherwise decided by the Board.

19. Residences.-Residences are for the use of the head teachers and their families, and cannot, without the express sanction of the Board, be let to, or be occupied by, any other person. The occupier shall be held responsible for any injury to the residence beyond fair wear-and-tear. From an outgoing teacher a certificate, signed by the Chairman of Committee, regarding the state of repair and the cleanliness of the residence, shall be required before his salary is paid.

WELLINGTON EDUCATION BOARD.

Education Board, Wellington, 15th June, 1910. In compliance with your request of the 25th May, I attach copy of the scale of allowances paid in this district to School Committees, excluding all grants for repairs paid out of buildingmaintenance votes. Where, as in a number of schools in this district, the children are accommodated in two different buildings, the Board estimates the amount payable on the separate averages of the children accommodated in each building. From the allowances made the Committees are required to provide for the following: -

(1.) Cleaning and sanitary service.(2.) Fuel and lighting.

- (3.) Pens, ink, and stationery.

(4.) Small repairs.

The Board pays, in addition to the capitation allowance, for,-(a.) Furniture-renewals rendered necessary by the ordinary wear-and-tear-e.g., chairs, blinds, sanitary buckets;

(b.) Asphalting:

(c.) Fencing;

(d.) Water-service;

(e.) Extra cleaning where temporary buildings are occupied, as, for instance, during the construction of a school, or occupation of hired rooms in cases where the school is too small.

(f.) The Board subsidizes to the utmost of its means the efforts of School Committees to effect permanent improvements.

The scale of payment quoted on attached sheet is smaller than in some other districts, but the Wellington Board makes to a larger extent than any other Board special grants where the special needs of the school render such assistance advisable.

If a school pass from a lower to a higher grade, the annual payment shall not be less than the highest amount payable to schools of the said lower grade. All payments based on the average attendance shall be calculated on the average attendance of the proceding year.

The "Incidental Expenses Fund" is expected to meet the cost of cleaning school buildings and premises, sweeping chimneys, providing fuel for the school rooms, making petty repairs to the school buildings, &c., and the expenses incurred in connection with the Committee's meetings, and must not be spent on prizes, fêtes, or entertainments.

24. The following articles will be supplied free of cost to all schools attended by children from two or more families: Ink, powder, chalk, blackboards, maps, and official envelopes (addressed). Foolscap for examination purposes will be supplied free of cost, at the rate of half a quire per annum, for each scholar in Standards III to VII. If any further supply be required, it must be paid for by the Committee.

(a.) The Board's scale of allowances to School Committees, exclusive of grants for repairs paid out of the building-maintenance votes, is as follows:—

For all schools having an average daily attendance of 1 and less than 12, nil.

For all schools having an average daily attendance of 12 and less than 26, 5s. 6d. per head per annum.

For all schools having an average daily attendance of 26 and less than 41, 5s. per head per annum.

For all schools having an average daily attendance of 41 and less than 91, 4s, 6d, per head per annum.

For all schools having an average daily attendance exceeding 90, 4s, per head per annum. (b.) The money contributed to the School Fund under the above scale is expected to meet the cost of cleaning school buildings and premises, sweeping chimneys, providing fuel for schoolrooms, making petty repairs to school buildings, &c., and the expenses incurred in connection with the Committee's meetings, and must not be spent on prizes, fêtes, or entertainments. Committees may purchase out of the school funds pens, ink, foolscap, blotting-paper, &c., for use of pupils in school.

The allowances are payable to Committees every quarter—namely, in February, May, August, and November. For general repairs, repainting, school furniture, fencing, and other items the Board makes grants as required to Committees on application.

In further addition, the Board supplies free school requisites, including foolscap plain and standard ruled blotting-paper, chalk, ink, pen and pencil holders, nibs, marking-pencils, official envelopes, and all school and Committee stationery, out of general administration accounts.

The cost of this supply, which is debit against School Committee accounts, amounts annually to a very close approximation of 1s. per capita of the average attendance.

No portion of the Board's contribution to Committees is allowed to be spent on prizes or school fêtes or entertainments.

In this connection I may state that out of the maintenance vote the Board is willing to pay pound-for-pound subsidy on all moneys voluntarily raised, and expended strictly in accordance with the conditions of the maintenance-vote grant: but under no circumstances is the subsidy paid on funds voluntarily raised by Committees for cleaning, fuel, or Committee expenses.

Incidental Expenditure.

The incidental allowances granted to School Committees are intended to be used for the following purposes, viz.:—

For keeping clean the schoolrooms, with all outbuildings, including scavengering when

recessary.

For providing fuel, and for having the schoolrooms kept properly warmed and the school chinneys swept.

For making necessary repairs to the school buildings, furniture, and premises, as detailed

below.

For defraying any expenses in connection with the Committee's business and correspondence, and any advertising ordered by the Committee.

For providing blotting-paper, foolscap, chalk, ink, and pens (including slate-pencils for the infants) used in the school.

Under the head of "Repairs" it shall be considered the Committee's duty,-

- (1.) To keep in good order and repair all furniture and apparatus used in the school, including gymnastic apparatus, for which the Board will take no responsibility;
- (2.) To glaze all broken windows, and to provide and fix new window-blinds and hat and coat hooks, or pegs, when required;
- (3.) To keep in repair all fastenings and hangings of doors and windows, including door handles and locks, sash-cords and fastenings, &c.;
- (4.) To keep in repair, clean, and free from birds' nests, dead leaves, or other obstruction, all gutters, valleys, spouting, and downpipes, and to refasten any loose shingles, iron, ridging, spouting, barge-boards, and flashings:
- (5.) To trim hedges, and to keep all fences (boundary-fences between the school grounds and the teacher's house or premises shall be trimmed or kept in repair, as the case may require, conjointly by the Committee and the teacher occupying the house), gates and posts, bridges and culverts, protective walls, closets and screens, asphalt or concrete paths and floors, in order and repair; to keep the school grounds tidy and level, and to clear off all gorse, broom, &c., and to comply with Road Board notices relative to same:
- (6.) To keep clean and in good order and repair all drains, channels, water tanks and stands, windmills and stands, wells, pumps, buckets, and filters:
- (7.) To provide door-mats, coal-scuttles, fire-irons, fenders, utensils for cleaning, and closet-pans, as required;
- (8.) Generally to attend to any repairs that may be needed for the good order and preservation of the school buildings and premises.

The Committee shall also report to the Board if the teacher fails to fulfil his agreement to keep the teacher's house and premises in good order. If the teacher occupying the house be a mistress, the Committee shall have the scavengering done and charge her with the cost, but such charge shall not be more than at the rate of £1 per annum.

SOUTH CANTERBURY EDUCATION BOARD.

Regulations for the Payment and Disbursement of the School Fund for Incidental Purposes.

- 1. For the purpose of meeting incidental expenses, every School Committee shall have the control of a fund called the "School Fund."
- 2. The School Fund shall consist of (a) regular grants for incidental expenditure made by the Board: (b) donations, voluntary subscriptions, and all other moneys which may be paid to the Committee for educational purposes.
- 3. The grants from the Education Board shall be applied to the following purposes: Repairing school furniture, buildings, premises, grounds, and fences: cleaning school buildings and premises: improving the school grounds; providing stationery for school use; providing such appliances as the Committee may deem necessary for educational purposes and the funds at its disposal will allow; paying expenses in connection with the Committee's meetings. No money from the Board's grants shall be spent on prizes, treats, or entertainments.
- 4. The grants from the Education Board shall be paid quarterly to the credit of the Committee, at such bank as they shall appoint. Moneys shall be withdrawn only by the authority of the Committee, and payments shall be made as far as possible by cheque, signed by the Treasurer and one other member appointed by the Committee.
- 5. Each Committee shall keep full accounts of receipts and expenditure in the books supplied by the Board for the purpose, and at the end of the year (31st March) shall make out a proper balance-sheet on the form provided for the purpose. The accounts shall be audited annually, and the books shall at any time be open to inspection by the Secretary of the Board. The balance-sheet, books, and vouchers must be sent to the Education Office for audit not later than the 5th April each year.

The Committees of district high schools will receive £5 per annum in addition to the amount allowed by the foregoing scale.

I have to point out that the above rate of payment is a considerable increase on the amount

formerly paid.

The sums contributed to the School Fund under the above scale are intended to meet the cost of cleaning school buildings and premises, sweeping chimneys, providing fuel for schoolrooms; repairing the school appliances, furniture, apparatus, &c.: improving the school grounds: and the expenses incurred in connection with the Committee's meetings and correspondence. The Board cannot undertake to make any further allowance for the above purposes. No portion of the Board's contribution to the School Fund shall be spent on prizes, certificates of good attendance, fêtes, or entertainments. Committees may purchase out of the School Fund pens, penholders, ink, and pencils for the pupils' use in school, and writing-paper and blotting-paper for their use at the examinations.

To encourage Committees to improve the condition of the school and grounds under their charge, the Board will be prepared to subsidize at the rate of £1 for £1 all moneys raised locally and expended wholly on the undermentioned works: Asphalting grounds, renewal of fencing of school premises and glebes, erecting shelter-sheds, &c. A subsidy shall on no account be paid unless the Board's sanction to the expenditure has been obtained prior to the works being carried out, and all applications for such sanction must be accompanied by a full statement of the proposed works and an estimate of their cost.

SOUTHLAND EDUCATION BOARD.

Allowances to School Committees.

1. The Board will contribute every year to the School Fund of the several schools according to the following scale:—

£10 will be paid to each school in the district having an average attendance of 20 to 25, inclusive, or upwards.

A capitation subsidy of 3s, 6d, per head will be paid for all pupils in average attendance above the number of twenty-five in each school.

2. The sums contributed to the School Fund under the above scale are intended to assist in meeting the cost of—

(1.) Cleaning school buildings and premises.

(2.) Providing fuel for schoolrooms.

(3.) Making necessary repairs on school buildings, premises, furniture, and fencing.

(4.) For defraying the expenses incurred in connection with the Committee's meetings and correspondence.

- 3. The Board cannot undertake to make any further allowance for the above purposes. No portion of the Board's contribution to the School Fund is to be spent on prizes or school fêtes and entertainments.
- 4. Grants for extra works in connection with schoolhouses and grounds, such as shelter-sheds, coal-sheds, ornamental fencing, and gravelling grounds (if made) shall be on the principle of a subsidy equal to the amount raised by any Committee for such extra works.

5. Applications for all works must be accompanied by a statement of the extent, nature, and

probable cost thereof.

6. Applications for refunds: No liabilities incurred by School Committees can be recognized

by the Board unless its sanction has first been obtained.

The foregoing regulations, which supersede all previously existing ones, were adopted at a special meeting of the Board held on the 2nd day of October, 1889, and will come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1890.
