It is obvious, therefore, that we cannot look to the possible causes (1) and (3) for an explanation of the matter. No. (2) only partly accounts for the increases in the preparatory classes, and it remains to examine No. (4). In December, 1905, there were nearly 3,000 children less in the preparatory classes than there were children under eight years of age attending school (36,823, as against 39,781); whereas in 1910 the number of children in the preparatory classes exceeded the number under eight years of age attending school by over 8,000 (55,563, as against 47,263).
