a direct gain to societies in that the complicated problem of financial improvement is now capable of being grasped by the more intelligent members, who are able to approach the question much better equipped and with some knowledge of the work they are called upon to carry out.

A most informative memorandum by the Actuary (Mr. A. T. Traversi) on the meaning of a valuation has been included in the publication of the Friendly Societies Act recently issued by this office. This memorandum, which is entitled "The Finance of a Friendly Society," can be obtained free on application to the Registrar.

ANNUAL RETURNS.

The Friendly Societies Act provides that every society and branch shall, before the 31st March in each year, send to the Registrar a general statement (called the "Annual Return") of the income and expenditure, and of the funds and effects of the society or branch for the preceding year terminating on 31st December.

It is satisfactory to report that the work of secretaries in furnishing the 1910 returns shows a substantial improvement as compared with the previous year, the Druid order having made a particularly good showing. The details are given in the following statement showing the number outstanding at the closing-date:—
