The buildings and grounds are in excellent order, and the work has run very smoothly through the year; the only cause for regret is that the public do not fully appreciate the facilities afforded and the amount of good to be derived from attending the classes. In order to arouse interest in the work and show what the classes really are capable of, I would suggest that before opening the classes next year there should be an exhibition of this year's work in the school. The balance-sheet shows that there is a cash-balance at the bank of £23 3s. 10d., but as £62 0s. 6d. is owing by the Department for capitation and subsidy, the amount in hand, after paying outstanding expenses, to commence operations with next year will be £85 4s. 4d.
