As mentioned in my previous report, the work of building new locomotives was suspended during the year owing to material being unobtainable, and this, together with sale of old locomotives, accounts for a decrease in the total tractive power of 16,876 lb., equal to 0.19 per cent.

Now that hostilities have ceased material may be expected to arrive shortly, when the work of

building new locomotives will be resumed.

Boilers.—The work on renewals and repairs has been kept well up to date.
