The total funds of the societies and branches as on the 31st December, 1926, amounted to £3,337,683, made up as follows: Sick and Funeral Funds (inclusive of amounts transferred to special funds out of surplus), £3,103,473; Medical and Management Funds, goods, &c., £234,210. Dividing the total funds by the number of members at the end of the year it is found the average capital per member is now £35 6s. 8d.
