school to enter trades and industries is higher than in the case of pupils leaving the primary schools. The post-primary schools, therefore, are not creating a bias away from industrial occupations, but are assisting boys and girls to discover their inclination towards such occupations. There is no doubt that if, as is intended, the secondary schools are equipped in such a way as to enable the pupils to discover and develop their aptitudes in the direction of trade and industry a higher percentage of pupils will seek to enter other than clerical occupations.

The returns compiled by teachers also show the duration of the post-primary course taken by pupils who have now left school. Summarized, the position is as follows:—

There were on the 30th June, 1927, 25,314 children in attendance at Government schools providing secondary education, and of these 96 per cent. were holders of free places.
