The total number of appeals dealt with to the 31st March, 1931, was 3,697, the percentage upheld being 48 per cent.

Of the 611 cases dealt with during the past year, 330 were heard at Auckland, 56·7 per cent. being upheld; 119 at Wellington, 35·3 per cent. being upheld; 98 at Christchurch, 47 per cent. being upheld; and 64 at Dunedin, 51·6 per cent. being upheld.

Medical treatment of war pensioners during 1930–31 cost £83,394.

Railway concessions to war pensioners with locomotive disabilities in excess of 50 per cent. cost £1,876 during the year.

The loading paid on life-insurance policies of war pensioners due to war-service disability amounted to £196 for the year.

Temporary war pensions to soldiers increased by 118, and permanent pensions to soldiers by 120 during the year.

The 387 deaths among war pensioners are made up as follows: Soldiers, 145; widows of soldiers, 5; other dependants, 237.
