I have the honour to furnish herewith, for the information of Parliament, the report of the Department relating to war, old-age, widows', Maori War, miners', epidemic, blind, and sundry pensions, and family allowances for the year ended 31st March, 1932.

The following comparative statement relates to the annual value and gross payments of all pensions administered by the Department for the past two years:—

From the figures shown in the preceding tables, a large increase, with a consequential increased cost of expenditure, is revealed in the number of civil pensions in force, notably old-age and miners' pensions and family allowances, and the following figures indicate more clearly what an abnormal increase has taken place during the past two years:—

The underlying cause of this increase is the financial and industrial depression which the Dominion has been experiencing during this period, and a return to normal increases of pensions can only be looked for with the return to prosperous conditions generally. Economic necessity has undoubtedly brought forward many applicants who in normal times would not have been required to seek aid by way of pension or family allowance.

FAMILY ALLOWANCES.

The claims lodged during the year totalled 3,443, which, with the 279 outstanding from the previous year, made a total of 3,722 dealt with. Of these, 3,040 were accepted and 350 rejected. Of the rejected claims 146 represent cases where the income of the family was in excess of the limit allowed. 389 new claims from Maoris were finally dealt with during the year, 260 being granted and 129 rejected.

The total children of the 7,332 allowances in force as at 31st March, 1932, and those in excess of two in a family numbered 34,546 and 19,882, the average per family being 4.71 and 2.71 respectively.

The total amount paid during the year was £90,100, while the total annual value of all allowances in force at the close of the year was £101,608.

COST OF ADMINISTRATION.

The cost of administration for the year amounted to £61,611, the principal items of expenditure being £31,688 for salaries of officers of the Department, who numbered 160 as at 31st March, 1932; £14,961 and £4,847 paid to the Postal Department respectively for payment of pensions and postage and telegrams; £3,084 for salaries and other expenses of the War Pensions Appeal Board; and £2,189 for salaries of the War Pensions Board.

The percentage of cost of administration to the total payments made of £3,267,706 was 1.89.

The total number of appeals dealt with to the 31st March, 1932, was 4,214, the percentage upheld being 48 per cent.

Of the 517 cases dealt with during the past year, 260 were heard at Auckland, 51.9 per cent. being upheld; 102 at Wellington, 35.3 per cent. being upheld; 114 at Christchurch, 54.4 per cent. being upheld; and 41 at Dunedin, 46.3 per cent. being upheld.

Medical treatment of war pensioners during 1931-32 cost £77,405.

Railway concessions to war pensioners on maximum permanent disablement pension and those with locomotive disabilities on permanent pension in excess of 50 per cent. cost £1,760 during the year.

The loading paid on life-insurance policies of war pensioners due to war-service disability amounted to £176 for the year.

Temporary war pensions to soldiers decreased by 14, and permanent pensions to soldiers increased by 99 during the year.

The 432 deaths among war pensioners are made up as follows: Soldiers, 153; widows of soldiers, 5; other dependants, 274.

Disabled Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Act, 1930.

Although this Act to provide for re-establishment of disabled ex-soldiers in civil employment or occupation became law in October, 1930, it was not possible, owing to lack of finance, to put the Act into operation until July, 1931, when local advisory committees representative of the returned soldiers of the Dominion, South African War veterans, War Funds Societies, organizations of employers and of workers, the New Zealand Branch of the British Red Cross and Order of St. John, and the Government, were set up in Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin. These committees appointed sub-committees in the smaller centres. To act in conjunction with the committees, an employment officer was appointed at Auckland, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin.

Up to the present the efforts of the committees and employment officers have been confined to the classification of applicants, to the finding of employment for disabled soldiers and to the providing of vocational training at technical schools. While the procuring of suitable employment for disabled men is difficult during the present economic depression, when there are thousands of able-bodied unemployed available, the committees and employment officers have been able, in addition to procuring work of a casual nature, to obtain positions for sixty-two men. As it is trusted that the corner of the economic depression has been turned, and that trade and industrial conditions will improve from now on, it is hoped that the efforts of the committees and employment officers will slowly but surely meet with better success, particularly so if it is possible at an early date to place some funds at their disposal to assist in the work of enabling these disabled ex-soldiers to regain their place in civil life.
