The number of children committed to the care of the Superintendent during the year ended 31st March, 1935, was 442, classified according to reasons for committal, as follows: Indigent, 199; delinquent, 26; detrimental environment, 40; neglected, 8; not under proper control, 81; accused or guilty of punishable offence, 88; and, in addition, 7 were admitted by private arrangement (section 12, Child Welfare Act), while 43 were temporarily admitted, making the total number of admissions for the year 492. Of the children committed, 92 had been dealt with previously by the Courts for other offences, for which they had received terms of supervision.
