The above figures show an increase in membership equal to 0.47 per cent., as compared with a

decrease of 1.78 per cent. for 1933.

The total funds of the societies and branches as at the 31st December, 1934, amounted to £4,676,427, made up as follows: Sick and Funeral Funds (inclusive of amounts transferred to special funds out of surplus), £4,332,392; Medical and Management Funds, goods, &c., £344,035. Dividing the total funds by the number of members at the end of the year it is found the average capital per member is now £46 8s. 9d.

Taking the several years 1925–1934 the number of lodges whose returns were tabulated, the number of members, total funds, and average capital per member at the end of each year were as
