Staff.

I desire to record the loyalty and assistance rendered during the year by the Audit Office staff.

The work and responsibility devolving upon the staff increase progressively with the creation of new departmental activities and the ever-widening scope of legislative enactments, and during the year the officers discharged their onerous duties to my entire satisfaction.

A word of commendation is due to those members of the staff who have devoted much of their leisure-time to acquiring the special accounting knowledge essential to the efficient carrying-out of their duties. More than one-third of the officers of the Department have now passed their final Accountants' Professional Examination.

Government Departments and local bodies are required by statute to give all information and explanations which the Audit Office may at any time require, and I am pleased to be in a position to say that they have given every assistance to Audit Inspectors and Examiners.
